### **BENCH AND BAR DISCUSSION ON FEDERAL PRACTICE**

The 2019 Federal Judicial Roundtable (Bench and Bar Discussion on Federal Practice) is anticipated to host more than 20 federal judges and 130 practitioners.

The Roundtable offers Florida Bar members an opportunity to closely interact with federal judges and practitioners about current developments and challenges in federal practice.

**PROFESSOR HOWARD M. WASSERMAN** is Professor of Law at FIU College of Law, where has taught since 2003, and previously was a law professor at FSU. Professor Wasserman teaches civil procedure, evidence, federal courts, civil rights, and First Amendment. He has published extensively about freedom of speech, procedure and jurisdictional issues in public-law and civil-rights litigation, and recently published on baseball's Infield Fly Rule. He is a member of the Ad Hoc Committee on Rules and Procedure of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Florida. He blogs at PrawfsBlawg, is the Section Editor for the Courts Law Section of JOTWELL, and is a Contributor at SCOTUSBlog. Professor Wasserman graduated magna cum laude from Northwestern University School of Law, where he was an associate articles

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editor of the Law Review and was named to the Order of the Coif. Following law school, he clerked for Chief Judge James T. Giles of the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania and Judge Jane R. Roth of the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit. Professor Wasserman is a loyal Chicago Cubs fan.
